LEADERS COUNCIL MEETING

The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 17, at 7:00 pm via zoom. Please contact Carlea Liermann if you'd like to attend. During this meeting we will discuss the new spring/summer in-person programming guidelines and how to re-scheduling the postponed programming. We will also discuss the upcoming annual meeting, along with the elections for the Board of Directors, and the budget for the 2021-2022 4-H year. For the annual meeting there will be three adult board of director seats that will be up for re-election in April, along with electing three youth positions for the Board of Directors.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FEBRUARY 4-H LEADERS COUNCIL MEETING

The Calumet County 4-H Leaders Council Board of Directors met on Wednesday, February 17, at 6:00 pm via zoom. During their meeting the Board went over the progress of their goals and the extension of enrollment to be eligible to show at the 2021 Calumet County Fair. 4-H Educator also gave an update on current programming, and some youth participants were able to share and talk about their experience participating in the programming. The Board of Directors started planning for the annual meeting and discussing which seats are up for re-election, and made plans on how to recruit some new members.

LEADERS COUNCIL BOARD ELECTIONS

Elections are scheduled to take place at the 4-H Leaders Council Annual Meeting on Wednesday, April 21, at 7:00 pm, at the Fairgrounds. This year we are looking to elect three new adult leaders and three youth leaders. Adult leaders are elected for a three-year term, while youth leaders (Grades 9 and up) are elected for a one-year term. The purpose of the council is:

- To assist the county Extension Office in planning, implementing, and evaluating the year's 4-H Youth Development Program.
- To bring up for discussion problems and ideas of the community 4-H clubs and their leaders.
- To arrange for project education and leadership development training.
- To further in all ways the 4-H Development program in Calumet County.
- To accept funds for the advancement of the 4-H development program, educational activities, and awards.
- Calumet County 4-H Leaders Council follows the Wisconsin 4-H Policies.

A pinewood derby is a racing event where you build your own car from kits containing a block of pine, plastic wheels, and metal axles. The Leaders Council will purchase the kits for our 4-H members to participate! If an adult or non-4-H participant would like to compete as well, they would need to pay \$4.00 for their kit.

Blocks can be whittled with a hand knife, bandsaw, or Dremel carving tool for major shaping. Decals can be bought to decorate your car, or you are encouraged to use your imagination to paint and decorate the way you'd like!

Dates have yet to be determined. We'll keep you posted ... Hopefully late spring or early summer!

Please know the event may be a little different this year due to guidelines in place related to Covid-19. We will hold the event, but may need to have some changes from past years to ensure the safety of all participants, volunteers, and their families. WISCONSIN AG IN THE CLASSROOM ESSAY CONTEST

The Wisconsin Ag In the Classroom Essay Contest is open to all 4th and 5th grade students. This year's essay contest topic is "How have Wisconsin Soybean Farmers fueled Wisconsin's economy?" Essay submissions must be 100 to 300 words in length and will be judged on content, grammar, spelling, and neatness. The book of the year which can be a resource for this essay is "Full of Beans: Henry Ford Grows a Car" written by Peggy Thomas. A copy of this book can be found in the Brillion, Chilton, and New Holstein Public libraries. A copy of the book was given to each elementary school library. The books were donated by the Calumet County Farm Bureau.

"There is so much behind the Henry Ford story and his connection to agriculture," said Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom Coordinator Darlene Arneson. "The book looks at how Henry Ford grew up on a farm and searched for ways to use soybeans in the car plant, in his diet and in other ways. The essay contest focuses on how soybeans continue to be used and how they impact Wisconsin's economy."

Last year's State winner was Lindsay Geiger, daughter of John and Laura Geiger, and member of the Chilton Tip Top 4-H Club, Chilton. Her teacher was Carrie Stammer, Chilton Area Catholic School. One winner is selected from each of the nine districts in the state. From these district winners the state winner is selected. Congratulations Lindsay!

4-H Club Meetings

Almost every 4-H club holds **regular** club meetings. Even within the same club, no two club meetings are the same. Ideally, every meeting should have three parts—**recreation (fun)**, **business**, and **learning**. Youth leadership plays a huge role in the success of a club.

Most clubs have youth officers (president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and other selected roles) who are responsible for running each meeting. Youth leaders not only gain excellent life skills, they help to keep the meeting relevant and fun for members of all ages. All youth have a responsibility to contribute to their clubs through their voice and their actions!

What is **my role** as an adult?

Adults help create a safe, positive atmosphere for all 4-H members when they empower and encourage youth. While at a meeting, it's important to be a positive role model for everyone in attendance. Caring adults play an important role in the mental health of youth, and 4-H can help connect youth with positive adults.

Make this a **positive experience**.

1. Actively listen to all 4-H members.
2. Let youth run the meeting. It's their club!
3. Attend as many meetings as possible.
4. Ask your club leader how you can help.
5. If you have a hobby or skill, consider offering to be a guest speaker!

Should I **stay** or should I **go**?

It's strongly recommended that parents/guardians attend the 4-H meeting with your child. Club meetings provide great opportunities to learn with other club members, but the learning doesn't stop there. By attending the meeting, you can reflect on the meeting together and continue the education outside the club.

Get to Know Your Club

How is the meeting run?

Most 4-H clubs use **parliamentary procedure** to make club decisions. See if you can put the five steps of this procedure in order. Each step is written in **bold**. The answers are found at the bottom of the adult edition.

Re-state the Motion—The president restates the motion before the group votes.

1. _____

Discussion—The motion is discussed by all members. Members might want to bring up good or bad things about the motion, or maybe find some ways that it needs to be changed.

2. _____

Motion—A motion is a request that something can be done. Only one motion should be placed before the group at one time. A motion can be discussed and changed.

3. _____

Vote—The group votes to decide if they will pass or deny the motion. Voting usually happens by voice. Members say “aye” if they agree, and “nay” if they disagree. Voting sometimes happens in other ways (secret ballot, show of hands).

4. _____

Second—If someone agrees with the motion, they can “second the motion,” which means it can be discussed by all members.

5. _____
