Youth Mental Health First Aid Training Saturday, September 25, 8:30 am - 3:30 pm, Calumet County Courthouse Room #025. Participants are asking to bring their own lunch.

Youth Mental Health First Aid is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or addictions challenge or is in crisis. Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people.

Who should be trained?

- People who work with youth
- Youth group leaders, camp counselors
- Parents
- Teachers, school staff, coaches

Trainings are offered through the Wisconsin Rural Opioid and Stimulant Engagement (WiROSE), funded by SAMHSA to address opioid and stimulant prevention, intervention, and recovery. WiROSE is a project of the Extension Health and Wellbeing Institute.



COUNTY FAIR ENTRY DEADLINE - JULY 31

Have you decided what you are entering in the county fair yet? Here are a few suggestions of what to consider when selecting exhibits to enter.

Enter exhibits only in Junior Class Departments that reflect the 4-H projects you are enrolled in this year. 4-H is an educational program designed to help youth learn and master new skills in various project areas. The county fair is the culminating event of the year, like a science or art fair at school. Here, the youth bring exhibits that demonstrate all they have learned and worked on throughout the year.

Most junior class departments match up closely with the 4-H project area titles. However, there are a few departments that cluster several project areas together, including...

<u>Natural Sciences</u> – includes projects such as Exploring Your Environment, Wildflowers, Adventure activities, the Shooting Sport projects, Recycling, Wisconsin Wildlife, and Fishing.

<u>Mechanical Sciences</u> – includes projects such as Small Engines, Bicycle, Aerospace, Scale Models, and Robotics. <u>Family and Child Development</u> – includes Intergenerational, Personal Finance, and Entrepreneurship.

Youth should select exhibits that they feel show the best of their project work. It isn't our goal to enter everything we've done through the year, but rather to help the youth to learn to reflect and evaluate what exhibits are most meaningful to them and best show their efforts. Parents and leaders may offer valuable guidance to youth in this process, but ultimately, it is the youth's decision.

Read the Fair rules carefully! Everyone should read the "General Rules & Regulations," as well as the rules in each of the Departments that they are entering. If you are exhibiting animals, please also make sure to read the "WI County, District & State Fairs 2021 Animal Health Rules & Regulations."

Double-check your entry form. Please make sure that you are using the 2021 Junior Fair Book at http://calumetcountyfair.com/fair_handbook.html, as some of the codes and numbers have changed since 2019. Entries not recorded correctly will make you ineligible for fair premiums. Feel free to ask your project leader to help you check your entries.

Keep a copy of your entry form for your own reference. This will make it easier to prepare for the fair and prevent unwelcome surprises on Advance Judging Day, Saturday, August 28.

Submit the fair entry form, with entry fees either online or to Clara Hedrich, Fair Secretary, by the July 31 deadline. Clara's address is on the "All Classes Entry Form." Early submissions are preferred! You can mail in this entry form and fees, or drop them off at Clara's rural Chilton home. NO entry forms will be accepted at the Extension Office.

Animal Exhibitors – Be sure to record Animal Showmanship on your Entry Form and list your premise ID number must be listed.

Club Fair Booth, Reporter's Scrapbook, Banner, and Planter entries are part of Department 032 – Youth Group Entries and must be listed on your <u>club's</u> entry blank if entering.

Finally, if you are an experienced 4-H family, please take a moment to check in with the new families in your club. The county fair entering and exhibiting process can be a bit confusing and overwhelming at first, so we each need to make sure we are doing what we can to make this an awesome experience for everyone. If you have questions on your fair entries, don't hesitate to contact the 4-H Office.

Remember that adults can exhibit items too! Projects would be exhibited in the Open Class Departments.

FAIRBOOKS

The 2021 Calumet County Fairbook is posted on the fair website <u>http://calumetcountyfair.com</u> (<u>exhibitors tab</u>). Fill out the entry form and send a check for exhibitor and stall/pen fees to Clara Hedrich or key in your entry and pay online. Remember that **fair entry deadline is July 31**. If you have questions on entering, don't hesitate to contact the 4-H Office or other leaders/families from your club. If you don't have access to the internet, a copy of the fairbook is available for viewing at the 4-H Office and all main 4-H club leaders have also received a printed copy of the Junior Class Fairbook.

FAIR ONLINE ENTRIES AVAILABLE

This year you will be able to do your fair entries online. Watch for the link on the fair website starting July 1, 2021. You can still send in a paper copy with payment.

4-H BOOTHS

4-H clubs making their plans for the 2021 4-H booth should keep in mind that the 4-H theme for this year is "Create your Masterpiece with 4-H."

The fair booth size is 5' wide by 4' deep by 8' high. Some have an electrical outlet. Remember: each club wishing to reserve a booth must submit a fair entry by the July 31 deadline.

Important: No staples will be allowed.

PLEASE REMEMBER: 4-H booths are a <u>youth entry</u>, so ONLY 4-H members, not parents or leaders, should be putting the booth in place. We ask for all clubs' cooperation on this guideline, to make it a youth-centered learning experience.

Please see the fairbook (Department 032) for a list of criteria that the booth will be evaluated on.

Booths may be put up on Tuesday, August 31, or Wednesday, September 1, from 10:00 am – 8:00 pm.

CLUB PLANTERS

The Calumet County Master Gardeners are making available large flowerpots for 4-H clubs that would like to get involved with a "Youth Club Flower Display." These displays will be judged at the fair, receive fair premiums, and have a chance to win a \$25.00 for the top flower display. Planter criteria includes:

- 1) Planter must be entered on the Club Fair Entry Form (Department 032, Division 248, Class 01).
- 2) Planter must be entered between 4:00-8:00 pm on Thursday, August 29, at the Exhibition Building.
- 3) Planter must contain a minimum of five plants. Plants can be the same variety or can be different.
- 4) All plant material must be live.
- 5) Artificial material can be used as an accent.
- 6) 4-H club must be identified with a sign not to exceed 36 square inches. Sign must be placed in the planter.
- 7) Exterior of the planter cannot be altered.
- 8) Planter and plant material become the property of the Calumet County Master Gardener Association after entry. Accent material and 4-H Club sign will be returned.

Please check with club members to see if you club received a planter last year, then contact the 4-H Office to reserve your planter.

Making Memories at the Fair



Going to and exhibiting at the fair is often a major highlight for 4-H youth. For some youth, that may be participating in their community, county, or regional fair. For others, that may mean exhibiting at the Wisconsin State Fair. No two fairs are the same, but they do share the opportunity for 4-H members to show off their accomplishments.

Who organizes the fair?

The Wisconsin Association of Fairs and DATCP (Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection), gives leadership to county fair boards and associations. Those local entities are responsible for organizing the fair. Most fairs have volunteers who serve in roles called superintendents. They serve as a valuable link between the fair and the exhibitors to make sure judging goes smoothly and answer questions related to exhibit scoring. Please be kind to the superintendent — they freely give their time to help the fair and your child.

How to help your 4-H member find success

- Be prepared. Read the premium book and get familiar with fair entry rules for your 4-H member's exhibits. Check with your local fair for their premium book and exhibitor rules.
- Make it **educational**. Ask your 4-H member questions about their project(s). Helping youth reflect on their work can also help with their preparation for exhibiting.



- Keep everything in perspective and be supportive. Even if the color of the ribbon wasn't what your exhibitor was looking for, you can help them focus on what they learned in the process.
- Have fun and make memories! The fair is full of opportunities that will stick with your family for a long time. Adults are key to ensuring that it's a positive experience for youth.

This might mean a specific goal, or this might also be how you feel after the fair is done. What will make you feel good about what you did?

What do you need to get done to be ready for the fair?

Create a list of steps you need to get done to be ready to show your exhibit. Think about requirements the fair might have or finishing touches your exhibit needs to be "show ready." If you're not sure what the fair requirements are, have an adult help you look through your fair's premium book!

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Judges might ask you questions about your project. Start thinking about your answers!

Why did you select this project? Who helped you along the way? What did you do to prepare from start to finish? What challenges did you face? What was the hardest part? What did you learn while doing this project? How can you use what you learned to help you in everyday life?
