## **4-H Leaders Council**

#### LEADERS COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHT

The Leaders Council met on Wednesday, October 19th at 7pm at the Courthouse. During the meeting, we reviewed National 4-H Week, Festival of Fun, and discussed the programming coming over throughout the rest of the year. The board made the decision to pay \$50 of the registration fee for the delegates attending Fall Forum this year. We have 13 total delegates who will be attending and representing Calumet County 4-H. President Jessie Jansen also shared the availability of Cobblestone for the 4-H dance, and the board decided to hold the dance on Friday, February 3rd. The board also selected the recipients of the awards for this year's recognition dinner.

The next board meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, November 9th at 7pm in Room #025 at the Calumet County Courthouse. A good chunk of this meeting will be preparing for the recognition dinner that will be held the following weekend. They will go over the speech and program, along with going over the final details of the evening. There will be no December meeting, and the board will plan to meet again in January.

### Celebrate Your SMART Goal Successes

Celebration is an important part of the goal process. Recognizing accomplishments unifies 4-H members around an outcome, reminds them to focus on the positive, and motivates them to create new goals. Wisconsin 4-H promotes celebrating your successes through the offering of grants to clubs and groups that met their 2021 Charter SMART goals.

Did your Wisconsin 4-H club or group meet their 2021 charter SMART goals? Apply for a Wisconsin Chartered 4-H Club and Group SMART Goal Grant and celebrate with your members and those who helped you meet the goal.

Funds are available to celebrate as a club or group your success! Approximately 30 grants will be awarded for the following amounts: \$100, \$200, or \$300.

Grantees will be contacted after December 12, 2022, if they will be awarded the funds to celebrate their SMART goal success! Clubs and groups will be selected based on the level of youth involvement in the goal planning, actionable steps/objectives to reach the goal and the celebration plans.

Your club or group can decide how to spend the SMART goal celebration funds.

We ask in return for the grant funds that you send us a photo and caption telling us how the funds were used to celebrate the club's SMART goal success. We may share your story on social media and in the WI 4-H


# **NEW Building Safe Spaces Training for Volunteers Coming December 1st!**

Who should take Building Safe Spaces Training? Volunteers and staff who work with youth in Extension Programs.

When should you take the training? The training opens on December 1, 2022. All new volunteers or returning volunteers that enroll on or after December 1st will be required to take the training. If you already enrolled as a volunteer, you will not be required to take the training until September of 2023.

What is the training about? Building Safe Spaces is designed to keep youth and adult volunteers safe. In three short modules, volunteers will learn to:

- Identify activities that put youth in danger
- Explore ways to keep youth safe in Extension programs
- Understand the difference between appropriate and inappropriate physical touch



Where can you take the training? This is an interactive online training that works best on a computer or laptop, but can also be accessed on a mobile device and offline. If you do not have access to a computer or internet, contact your local educator for an offline version of the training. Each of the three modules takes approximately 10 minutes to complete (15 minutes in Spanish). If you need to stop, you can pick up where you left off. A pinewood derby is a racing event where you build your own car from kits containing a block of pine, plastic wheels, and metal axles. The leaders Council will purchase the kits for our 4-H members to participate! If an adult or non-4-H participant would like to compete as well, they would need to pay \$4.00 for their kit. Blocks can be whittled with a hand knife, bandsaw, or Dremel carving tool for major shaping. Decals can be bought to decorate your car, or you are encouraged to use your imagination to paint and decorate the way you'd like!

Car kits will be at the kick-off for pick-up on Saturday, January 8th, as part of the 4-H Family Fun Day at Brillion Community Center.



The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will sponsor the art contest, open to any current Wisconsin 4-H member, with cash prizes totaling nearly \$1,000. The contest will be held virtually, with photos of all entries submitted electronically. Entries will be accepted from Tuesday, November 1, 2022, until midnight on Sunday, January 15, 2023.

The contest is broken into nine categories:

- 1. Drawing Using Any Medium
- 2. Painting (acrylic, watercolor, or oil)
- 3. Pottery, Ceramics, or Clay
- 4. Photography
- 5. Paper
- 6. Fabric, Yarn, or Fiber
- 7. Wood
- 8. Any Other Media (ex: digital, metalcraft, jewelry, leatherwork, wax, eggshells, taxidermy, etc.)
- **9.** 4-H Art

A winner will be chosen in each category with a Best of Show award given to one entry chosen by the judging committee. Category winners will receive a \$100 cash award. The Best of Show entry will receive an additional \$150 cash award. Other art may be recognized but will not receive a cash award. Winners will be notified by email in February. A complete winner's list, as well as photos of the winning entries, will be on the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Website by late February.

To be eligible for the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Art Contest, youth must be a 4-H member enrolled in 4H Online for the 2022-2023 4-H Program Year. Entrants do <u>not</u> need to be enrolled in any specific project to participate.

# **Calumet County 4-H Attendance Policy**

Members are required to attend a minimum of 1/3 of their club's annual meetings

- Grade 13 members (college/technical school) are exempt from attendance requirement, but are encouraged to attend as many club meetings as possible. Younger members gain from older youth interaction and positive role modeling.
- Members can be excused from 50 percent of their club's total number of meetings. Excused meetings do not count towards the attendance requirement.
  - Members need to be excused prior to the club meeting.
  - ♦ Each club should decide how and who to call for excused absences.
  - Approved excused absences include: church related activity, school functions, work, illness, family emergencies, other scheduled 4-H activities.
- Clubs have the authority to set higher attendance requirements than this stated county policy. (Check with your club leader for club rules and guidelines.)
- Youth who do not meet attendance requirements:
  - ♦ Will not be able to show at the county fair as a 4-H exhibitor

Main leaders will be expected to notify the 4-H Office about those members not meeting the attendance requirement. By June 1, the 4-H office will send a list of the enrolled members to the Main Leader of each club with a form to complete and return by August 1.

♦ Will not be eligible for honor trips and awards the following year.

Example: If a club holds 12 meetings in the year, the minimum requirement for a member is:

- 1. Must attend 4 meetings
- 2. Be excused from 6 meetings
- 3. Leaving 2 that would be unaccounted for



# 4-H Club Meetings

Almost every 4-H club holds **regular** club meetings. Even within the same club, no two club meetings are the same. Ideally, every meeting should have three parts—**recreation** (fun), business, and learning. Youth leadership plays a huge role in the success of a club.

Most clubs have youth officers (president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and other selected roles) who are responsible for running each meeting. Youth leaders not only gain excellent life skills, they help to keep the meeting relevant and fun for members of all ages. All youth have a responsibility to contribute to their clubs through their voice and their actions!

# What is my role as an adult?

Adults help create a safe, positive atmosphere for all 4-H members when they empower and encourage youth. While at a meeting, it's important to be a positive role model for everyone in attendance. Caring adults play an important role in the mental health of youth, and 4-H can help connect youth with positive adults.

# Make this a positive experience.

- 1. Actively listen to all 4-H members.
- 2. Let youth run the meeting. It's their club!
- Attend as many meetings as possible.
- 4. Ask your club leader how you can help.
- 5. If you have a hobby or skill, consider offering to be a guest speaker!

# Should I stay or should I go?

It's strongly recommended that parents/guardians attend the 4-H meeting with your child. Club meetings provide great opportunities to learn with other club members, but the learning doesn't stop there. By attending the meeting, you can reflect on the meeting together and continue the education outside the club.

# How is the meeting run?

Most 4-H clubs use **parliamentary procedure** to make club decisions. See if you can put the five steps of this procedure in order. Each step is written in **bold**. The answers are found at the bottom of the adult edition.

Re-state the Motion—The president restates the motion before the group votes.	1.
Discussion—The motion is discussed by all members.  Members might want to bring up good or bad things about the motion, or maybe find some ways that it needs to be changed.	2.
Motion—A motion is a request that something can be done. Only one motion should be placed before the group at one time. A motion can be discussed and changed.	3.
Vote—The group votes to decide if they will pass or deny the motion. Voting usually happens by voice. Members say "aye" if they agree, and "nay" if they disagree. Voting sometimes happens in other ways (secret ballot, show of hands).	4.     5.
<b>Second</b> —If someone agrees with the motion, they can "second the motion," which means it can be discussed by all members.	Adapted from Quick and Easy Guide to Parliamentary Procedure, Wisconsin 4-H Southern District Leadership Team, 2001.
