Leaders Council

The next Leaders Council Board meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 8, at 7 p.m. in Room #025 at the Calumet County Courthouse. At this meeting, the board will discuss the 4-H Dance and how it went. They will also start planning for the Annual Meeting scheduled for April, board member elections, and discuss other countywide programming.

The Leaders Council Board met on Wednesday, January 11, at the Calumet County Courthouse at 7 p.m. During this meeting, they set the budget and audit date for Tuesday, February 15, at 6 p.m. Budget request will go in the February newsletter to be submitted by the date. 4-H Educator, Carlea, shared current membership data including the number of members, but also the number of new members and first generation members. She discussed the importance of knowing this information for the program. 4-H Family Fun Day was discussed as it was the next Saturday. The 4-H Dance was discussed as well. It was moved and seconded to have \$200 start-up cash for the 4-H Dance, with \$50 of it to be used as start-up for the Pinewood Derby kickoff. Tickets are available from the Extension Office. Members have noted the tickets are selling better this year now that the dance is free and the tickets are only raffle tickets.

Looking for a Calumet County 4-H Food Stand Manager

Purpose: The purpose of the Food Stand Manager is to insure the successful operation of the Calumet County 4-H Food Stand. The goal of the stand is to raise funds while offering good and reasonably priced food. Personal contacts and quality output are of major importance. This position reports to the 4-H Leaders Council Board of Directors.

Responsibilities:

- Oversee the operation of the 4-H Food Stand during the fair
 - ◆ Food stand is open from 9 a.m. until 10 p.m. Friday-Sunday, and 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. on Monday
 - Serve as contact person for vendors, 4-H Clubs, health inspector, etc.
 - Order food and supplies from vendors and purchase remaining items prior to the fair
 - Conduct food and supply inventory each evening so you can have replenishments come the next morning
 - Keep accurate records of accounts and expenses before & after the fair
 - ◆ Turn in all bills & coupons to the UW Extension Office at the end of the fair
 - ♦ Work with food stand committee to determine menu options & pricing
- Request a check for start-up cash from the 4-H Leaders Council
- Supervise & direct maintenance activities
- ♦ Schedule the 4-H clubs for their shifts
- Recruit & schedule shift coordinators
- Recruit help for stand clean up prior to the fair & to store equipment when the fair is completed
- Provide a positive learning experience for 4-H members, leaders, & other volunteers
- Supply ongoing reports to the 4-H Leaders Council Board of Directors





Interpretive Presentation - A memorized introduction should be included to credit the author. The options include: prose reading, poetry reading, a memorized piece, storytelling (where the story is told and not read), or an interpretive speech (a speech that had originally been written and presented by someone else). You may edit your selection to meet the time requirement. Original poetry or stories can also be used. If reading the selection, text should be mounted on construction paper instead of reading from a book. You should write an introduction and any transitions that are needed if you have more than one piece. NO props or costumes are permitted.

Interview Contest Guidelines

Youth in grades 3 and above are invited to participate in the first interview contest. Each participant will have a scheduled interview on the night of February 23rd. These interviews will be similar to the Educational Experience Scholarship Interviews, where it will be based off of your 4-H experience. Youth will be asked to submit a cover letter and resume prior to the registration deadline on February 15th, so the interviewer has time to review ahead of time.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Scholarships

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$20,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2023. To be considered for financial support, applications will be accepted starting December 15, 2022, and must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Wednesday, March 15, 2023, 5:00 pm. Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development and leadership in 4-H, academic performance and future educational goals.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships, students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three years; should have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college, or technical school during the 2023-2024 academic school year. Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship.

Calumet County 4-H Washington DC Experience

Thank you to Herb Kohl Philanthropies, we are able to provide the opportunity for 40 Calumet and Manitowoc County 4-H youth, ages 13 & up, to travel to Washington D.C. Monday, July 24th-Friday, July 28th.

If you are currently 13 or older, and are interested in participating in the Calumet & Manitowoc Counties 4-H Learning Journey to Washington D.C. July 24-28, 2023, please fill out the below application by February 28th. The adult advisor team will meet after this and youth will be notified via email of their participation by the end of March. Parents will need to then accept the experience and fill out all appropriate paperwork. There will be alternates selected in case of a cancellation.

More about the experience:

The Washington D.C. Learning Journey is a grant funded opportunity through the Herb Kohl Philanthropies. Due to the nature of the grant, the opportunity for this learning journey is for youth who have not experienced Washington D.C. Youth who have attended Washington D.C. on another experience (school, 4-H, etc.) are welcome to still apply, but please know priority will be given to those who have not been to Washington D.C. before.

We will travel to Washington D.C. on July 24. The group will be bussed to Washington D.C. via coach bus. We will tour Washington D.C. July 25-27, and then travel back to Wisconsin arriving the morning of July 28.

Other requirements of the grant is to attend the U.S. Capitol Building and go on a college tour. There is a strong chance the group will be touring the University of Maryland. We will also be going on a general tour of Washington D.C. including monuments, Smithsonian Museums, and more. There will be a good balance of STEM, Citizenship, and History learning opportunities. The final itinerary has not been set yet.

Youth will be roomed by gender in hotel rooms and the tour company provides overnight security. There will be four youth to a room as this is what the grant provides. The grant provides meals (\$10/meal) and are coordinated at fast food restaurants.

Cost will be \$25 to help cover the cost of t-shirts, snacks, and bottled water, as the remainder of the cost (travel, hotel, food, etc.) will be covered by HKP.

2023 WI 4-H State Livestock and Skill-a-thon Contest Contests

Mark your calendars for the upcoming 4-H Livestock Quiz Bowl and Skill-a-thon Contest! If you have participated in the past or this is the first time you are hearing about the contest, we would love to have you join us for this day of learning, fun, and competition.

What are the contests?

These are two different contests all about livestock where you can use your knowledge about the animal species (beef, sheep, swine, meat goat) and the industry.

Livestock Quiz Bowl:

Livestock Bowl is a quiz competition where all the questions are about beef, sheep, swine, and meat goat topics. Students use a buzzer to answer the questions (similar to the game show Jeopardy). Teams compete in a double-elimination format by

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giving oral answers to questions posed by a moderator. Each match has both an individual and toss-up question round. The top team earns the opportunity to compete at the national competition.

Livestock Skill-a-thon:

Everything you know about raising your animal adds up to so much knowledge of the species and the industry. The Skill -a-thon contest will help you challenge you to share that information through a written quiz and learning stations such as breed identification, feed identification, equipment identification as well as some team activities such as demonstrating evaluation skills. There are both individual and team stations. The top team earns the opportunity to compete at the national competition.

Who can participate?

Any current 4-H members, grades 3-13. Please note, there are age divisions for each of those contest and parameters for grade 13 members. Please see the contest information in the link below for more information on the age divisions. Even if your county has not participated in the past, round up some 4-H friends and take advantage of this fun opportunity to show your knowledge of the animal species and industry.


NEW Building Safe Spaces Training for Volunteers Coming December 1st!

Who should take Building Safe Spaces Training? Volunteers and staff who work with youth in Extension Programs.

When should you take the training? The training opens on December 1, 2022. All new volunteers or returning volunteers that enroll on or after December 1st will be required to take the training. If you already enrolled as a volunteer, you will not be required to take the training until September of 2023.

What is the training about? Building Safe Spaces is designed to keep youth and adult volunteers safe. In three short modules, volunteers will learn to:

- Identify activities that put youth in danger
- Explore ways to keep youth safe in Extension programs
- Understand the difference between appropriate and inappropriate physical touch



Where can you take the training? This is an interactive online training that works best on a computer or laptop, but can also be accessed on a mobile device and offline. If you do not have access to a computer or internet, contact your local educator for an offline version of the training. Each of the three modules takes approximately 10 minutes to complete (15 minutes in Spanish). If you need to stop, you can pick up where you left off. The 2023 WI 4-H ArtBEAT! will be held March 17th through the 19th at Upham Woods in Wisconsin Dells. The weekend will feature a variety of arts projects including music, drama, visual arts, and more! Camp check-in begins Friday at 6:30 p.m. and runs through Sunday at 11:00 a.m.

Session leaders will be 4-H older youth, adult leaders, and 4-H


New Award Opportunity - Clover Award

**New this year - If a county does not have a full 4-person team or at least 3 people to a team, they can enroll as an individual and be part of the Wisconsin All-Star Team. Teams will be put together by the State office.

Age Divisions - you must be a current enrolled 4-H member to participate:

- Cloverbuds cannot participate
- **Junior**: team contestants will be current 4-H members who are younger than 14 including those who will celebrate their 14th birthday during the year of the contest
- **Senior:** team contestants will be individuals who have already or will celebrate their 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, or 19th birthday during the year of the contest
- **Mixed age division:** designated for teams that are any combination of ages BUT the team must contain at least one youth in each age division

*Youth who are still enrolled in 4-H but have passed the year of their 19th birthday can compete in the mixed division.

The top senior teams will have the chance to compete in the National 4-H Dairy Experience at NAILE in Louisville, Kentucky. This is at the same time as NAILE. For more information on this contest, look at the 4-H dairy website.

Share-a-Kid Scholarship Opportunity

Each year, the Wisconsin Dairy Goat Association promotes interest in dairy goats in our state. One of the ways we encourage our young people in this aspect of agriculture is through our Share-a-Kid Program. We award an average of 4 to 6 dairy goat kids to young people across the state each year. This is a competitive statewide contest. The youth applicant will write an essay of 100 words or more about why they would like to have a dairy goat, how they are going to take care of her (food, shelter, and medical care), and if they have ever raised a goat. If the youth is new to raising goats, please include who your mentor is. This is a very competitive contest, and we want you to put a lot of effort into your essay. Spelling and content count. The essay can include drawings, photos, or any special things that you would like to include. Please keep a copy of your essay because no essays will be returned. If you are selected as a winner of a kid, your essay will be given to the donor. While we make every attempt to award winners one of their breeds of choice, if those breeds are not available, the Wisconsin Dairy Goat Association reserves the right to offer another breed to the winner. Share-a-Kid winners are not required to give a doe kid back to the program, but we encourage them to do so.

Rules:

- Youth must be between the ages of 10 and 17 by January of this year to enter
- Entries are accepted January 1st until April 1st of this year
- Entry form and all required signatures must accompany the essay
- Youth must be a member of 4-H, FFA, WDGA, or other agricultural groups
- Only 1 goat may be awarded per family per year, however, siblings are encouraged to enter
- Youth may only win one time
- Winners are required to show their goat at County Fair or in an open class goat show this year or the following year, depending on when fair entries close

If under any circumstance the kid received through the program is to be sold or re-homed, the individual

or party who donated the kid will retain the first right of refusal

- Youth who receive a kid must give updates to those who donated their kid at both 6 months and 12 months after the kid is received
- A thank you of some sort (letter, card, etc.) should be given to the individual or party who donated your kid at the time of pick up
- A photo should be taken at time of pick up of youth, donor, and donated kid. Please send digital copy of picture to Share-a-Kid Chair

Introduction of Rachel, the new Horse Leader

Hello my fellow 4-H'ers!

I just wanted to share a little bit about myself as I will be taking over the Horse Leader position for the Woodville Stars.

My name is Rachel Holzschuh. I am married to Mike and we have two daughters, Leslie and Regan. Both could be found on a horse trotting around somewhere or trying to rope or tie or whatever they can get their hands on.

I am very excited to share my knowledge of horses and various disciplines with our youth in the coming years. I have been on a horse since I could walk, and I have competed in multiple events such as Barrel Racing, Team Roping, Western Pleasure, Halter, and an Equestrian Drill team.

By the time I was 11, my dad was rodeoing pretty heavily throughout the Great Lakes Circuit, which is a total of nine states here in the Midwest. So, I would always wander off and guaranteed to come back to the horse trailer on a horse or with a flag in my hand waiting for the Grand Entry (the opening of a rodeo). The first Grand Entry I was ever in I was six years old and we were in Richmond, Kentucky. My dad always said, "if she's not sleeping, she's on a horse somewhere." If you have ever been around a rodeo, we really are just one big family, everyone watches out for everyone, and it really was the best way to spend my summers growing up.

I could also be found out on the skeet, trap, or sporting clay fields of my parents' gun shop. I would help with scoring or pulling for customers or shooting. Also, during this time, I was a member of the CWSL (Central Wisconsin Skeet League). I won High Lady in 2006.

While I never joined 4-H as a youth I was heavily involved in the NBHA (National Barrel Horse Association) and qualified for the Youth World Championships in Jackson, Mississippi. I qualified at age 9 for my first Youth World in 2001, again in 2003, and my last trip in 2009.

I also rode with the Rodeo City Riders Drill team from 2004-2009 performing at various drill team competitions, several PRCA rodeos, and parades. Along with other drill team activities, I helped coach the Pink Ribbon Rebels from 2016-2018.

I was the Midwestern Rodeo Queen in 2009. I did various radio, tv, and in-person interviews. I spent my summer traveling the Midwest representing my hometown rodeo. I was not your average rodeo queen. I spent countless hours scrubbing the stock horses, saddling horses for the stock contractors, and could even be found running up & down the grandstands selling 50/50 raffle tickets. This was also my first year as a Lions Member and have been active in the Manawa Lions Club since.

Since 2004, I have done and will continue to do rodeo openings for several stock contractors such as J Bar J, Barnes, Dakota Rodeo, and Joe Simon.

In 2014 & 2019, I carried the American Flag in Freedom Hall in Louisville, Kentucky, for the Great Lakes Circuit Finals Rodeo.

I joined the PRCA (Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association) in 2021 where I compete in team roping with my Dad.

I can be seen carrying the American Flag during the Midwestern Rodeo in Manawa, WI, over the 4th of July weekend, or carrying out my secretary duties for our Manawa Jr High/High School Rodeo.

I'm looking forward to a joint venture in broadening the knowledge and experiences of all equine activities.

Calumet County 4-H Attendance Policy

Members are required to attend a minimum of 1/3 of their club's annual meetings

- Grade 13 members (college/technical school) are exempt from attendance requirement, but are encouraged to attend as many club meetings as possible. Younger members gain from older youth interaction and positive role modeling.
- Members can be excused from 50 percent of their club's total number of meetings. Excused meetings do not count towards the attendance requirement.
 - ♦ Members need to be excused prior to the club meeting.
 - ♦ Each club should decide how and who to call for excused absences.
 - Approved excused absences include: church related activity, school functions, work, illness, family emergencies, other scheduled 4-H activities.
- <u>Clubs have the authority to set higher attendance requirements than this stated county policy.</u> (Check with your club leader for club rules and guidelines.)
- ♦ Youth who do not meet attendance requirements:
 - Will not be able to show at the county fair as a 4-H exhibitor

Main leaders will be expected to notify the 4-H Office about those members not meeting the attendance requirement. By June 1, the 4-H office will send a list of the enrolled members to the Main Leader of each club with a form to complete and return by August 1.

♦ Will not be eligible for honor trips and awards the following year.

Example: If a club holds 12 meetings in the year, the minimum requirement for a member is:

- 1. Must attend 4 meetings
- 2. Be excused from 6 meetings
- 3. Leaving 2 that would be unaccounted for

All Calumet County 4-H members are eligible and encouraged to participate in this countywide recognition program. The Clover Award is designed to recognize 4-H members for their active participation in Club, County, State, Regional, National, and International activities and events. By participating in activities and events, members can earn points towards the different recognition levels.

The program has five different recognition levels, each having minimum point requirements for completion. Members must complete the levels in order.

> GREEN LEVEL AWARD......55-69 Points BRONZE LEVEL AWARD......70-84 Points SILVER LEVEL AWARD...... 85 -99 Points GOLD LEVEL AWARD100-114 Points EMERALD LEVEL AWARD115 points or more

4-H members may take more than one year to earn a Clover Award but may only earn one (1) per year. An exception is made for older 4-H members who may not have enough years left in the 4-H program to earn all levels of achievement. Any 4-H member who was in 9th grade or above during the current school year is eligible to earn more than one (1) Clover Award per year if necessary.

To be recognized at the Calumet County Awards Program, you must submit your completed Clover Award application to your 4-H Club Leader by your September Club meeting.

Members should check all the items they participated in at the club, county, regional, state, national and international level. Members should identify additional information about an activity or event on the lines provided.

Members may only check one of the following three meeting attendance options:

20 - Attended all but one club meeting, or
15 - Attended or excused from all but two club meetings.



Beyond the Club




