Fair Information

Things to Know Before Coming to Advance Judging Day - August 26

Hopefully, you kept a copy or list of the items you listed on your Fair Entry Form. Use this list to help you remember what items you planned to bring.

Read the Junior Class Fairbook exhibiting guidelines for each department that you are exhibiting in for information on the date and time of judging, exhibit size requirements, and possible changes to hanger and displaying requirements.

Judging will run from 9:00am - 2:00pm, with staggered half hour lunch breaks for judges. You can come at any time during the day, but know that the process will take time (30 minutes to 3 hours, depending on the number of exhibits).

We strongly encourage families to make sure they arrive by 1:00pm, as judging ends at 2:00pm. Exhibitors must be in their final line by 2:00pm. Late exhibits will not be judged face-to-face and may be marked down one or more placings.

How to Enter Exhibits

<u>Step 1</u> - Pick up your exhibitor's packet at the Fair Secretary's Office. Packets will be available for pick-up on Wednesday, August 23, from 3:00-6:00pm or on Saturday, August 26, beginning at 8:30am. This envelope includes your fair pass, a computerized list of projects that have been entered, and your entry tags.

Step 2 - Attach tags to your individual projects. This can be done at home or in the Stanelle Building. (Make sure to use the correct tag for each project) String will also be provided if you cannot place a tag directly onto your project. The tags must be attached to the project with tape, string, staples, rubber bands, etc. <u>Please bring your own supplies if attaching at the Fairgrounds</u>.

<u>Step 3</u> - After all tags are attached, find the appropriate areas to have your projects judged.

Looking for Volunteers!

Older youth and adult volunteers are needed to record judging results and help display exhibits. Volunteer shifts are 8:45am - 11:45am, 11:30am - 2:30pm or all day (8:45am - 2:30pm) Both of these roles are a lot of fun! Please contact Tami or Carlea if you are interested in volunteering.

Junior Face-to-Face Judging

This type of judging allows for each exhibit to be judged on it own merit, rather than compared with other exhibits in the same class. Exhibitors bring their exhibits to the judge and talk to the judge about them.

General Face-to-Face Questions You May Be Asked:

- What do you like most/least about your project?
- What have you learned in doing this project?
- What would you like to learn more about in the future, related to this project?
- Where did you get the idea for this project? Who helped you?
- What was the easiest/most challenging part of making this exhibit?
- What would you do differently if you made the project again?

What if an Exhibitor cannot be present for their face-to-face judging?

It is preferred that the exhibitor prepares a 3x5" card that describes the exhibit, what they did and what they learned. Another exhibitor, parent, or leader may sit in for brief judges' comments. There is no automatic penalty for exhibitors who are not present for their judging. It is up to each judge to determine how the exhibitor's absence will affect the placing awarded.

Junior Class Crops, Vegetables, Flowers, Houseplants Judging

Junior Class (Dept. 14 & 15) Crops, Fruit, Vegetables, Flowers, Houseplants, and Plant Crafts judging at the Fair will be held on **Thursday, August 31, from 4:00-8:00 pm** in the Exposition Building at the Calumet County Fairgrounds. Club flower pots must also be brought in during this time. Junior Class Foods Judging Junior Class (Dept. 25) judging at the Fair will be held on <u>Thursday, August 31, from 4:00-8:00 pm</u> in the Brantmeier Building at the Calumet County Fairgrounds.

All food entries should be thoroughly cooled before being packaged at home on a <u>disposable</u> <u>plate</u> in a <u>Ziploc bag</u>. All cake decorating entries must be in a clear covered, disposable container.

Fair Booths

4-H clubs making their plans for the 2023 4-H booth should keep in mind that the 4-H theme for this year is "4-H...4 U, 4 Me, 4 Fun, 4 Life."

The fair booth size is 5' wide by 4' deep by 8' high. Some have an electrical outlet. Remember: each club wishing to reserve a booth must submit a fair entry by the July 31st deadline. <u>Important:</u> No staples will be allowed.

PLEASE REMEMBER: 4-H booths are a <u>youth entry</u>, so ONLY 4-H members, not parents or leaders, should be putting the booth in place. We ask for all clubs' cooperation on this guideline, to make it a youth-center learning experience.

Please see the Fairbook (Department 032) for a list of criteria that the booth will be evaluated on. Booths may be put up on <u>Tuesday, August 29th, or Wednesday, August 30th, from 10:00 am-8:00 pm.</u>





4-H Foods Auction

The 4-H Foods Auction will be Friday, September 1, at 5:00 pm in the Family Entertainment Tent. Only Junior Foods pies, decorated cakes, and cupcakes will be sold during the live food auction. For an exhibitor to receive 75% of their sale proceeds, they must be present to showcase their entries at the auction, or identify your replacement if you have a schedule conflict. Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to recruit buyers and send thank-you cards to the buyer of their entry. All other perishable Junior Foods items will be displayed on a table for buyers to purchase via free will donation, much like a bake sale.

Help is needed for the bake sale! Contact Carlea to volunteer. All proceeds from the live auction and bake sale will be donated to the 4-H Leaders Council.

Livestock Comfort at the Fair

A hot fair leaves fair exhibitors looking for coolness for both themselves and their fair animals. When temperatures reach above 80 degrees and the relative humidity is above 65 percent, comfort is certainly compromised. This kind of weather can be especially deadly for swine, as they have nonfunctioning sweat glands. Effects of heat stress are hard on livestock. Here are some suggestions to keep your animals cool.

Signs of heat stress:

Animals under stress will be uncomfortable, much like we are when enduring this heat. General signs of stress are: panting, open mouth breathing, excessive salivation, lack of coordination, trembling, inability to stand and high rectal temperature. During a heat wave it is difficult for animals to maintain their normal body temperature. Research indicates as the heat and humidity increases during the heat of the day so does the body temperature of animals. If the heat and humidity continue during the evening hours and for many days, the animal can't recover to its normal body temperature. Effects of heat stress can reduce feed intake, reduce weight gain, perhaps even death.

Transportation of animals:

Before transportation make sure the animals have been hydrated and sprinkle animals with water. Use wet shavings for bedding, never use straw. Straw acts as an insulator. Transport animals during the coolest part of the day, such as early morning or late evening. Hauls as few animals as possible, don't crowd animals in the trailer. In the trailer, open ventilation holes. Load and unload promptly. Fairs may need to adjust their schedule of arrival and departure of animals to accommodate the cooler part of the day.

Barns at the fair:

There should be ample ventilation within the barns at the fair. When heat and humidity can't be lowered, more air movement across people and animals can help remove heat and lower heat stress. Generators might be needed for supplemental electricity and should be located away from spectators as they are noisy and distracting. If animals are located on the outside edge of a barn where sunlight shows, use tarps to shade the morning or afternoon light. Make sure it isn't trapping heat, making the situation worse. Consider using a mesh shade cloth that blocks the sun but allows the breeze in.

At the fair:

Check in is a situation where fair staff should consider an alternative time for weighing, ultrasounding, and other animal tasks. Facilities should lend themselves to a low stress environment and the process should be quick and effortless. The show also might need to be conducted at an alternative time. Moving the show into the evening hours could be advantageous. Water animals and utilize electrolytes if needed to get animals to drink. Allow access to water at all times, without them making a mess of their pen. Rinse animals to keep cool. It might be easier and less stressful to rinse them in their pen rather than taking them to a wash rack numerous times throughout the day. Early release of animals from the fair may need to be considered. Loadout procedures should be followed as stated earlier. Animal grouping should be another consideration if possible. Don't put as many animals in a pen and leave some distance between tied animals in the barn.

Additional ways to mitigate heat stress:

- Invest in some durable fans. Resist the urge to buy a cheap, household fan; spend the extra money for a high velocity farm fan. These fans will move more air for your animal's comfort. Know the rules of the fair on where you can put and hang fans. While we are looking to keeping our animal safe we also need to keep the fair goers and young children safe.
- Consider freezing ice in plastic pop bottles for the animals to lay on. This is especially helpful with swine as it is difficult for them to get rid of body heat.
- Avoid overworking the animals during the high peak times of the day. Work livestock in the early morning and late afternoon.
- Consider feeding the majority of the animal's diet in the evening. Digestion increases the animal's body temperature, therefore digestion in the evening during the coolest time of day would be best.
- Consider feeding more concentrates rather than hay. Concentrations such as corn, contribute less to the heat of digestion than hay.
- Sprinklers with big water drops can cool down animals. Misting (small drops) may just add humidity and could make the problem worse.

Other items to keep in mind:

 Animals that have past health problems can be more affected by heat stress than animals with no prior health problems.

- Heavier livestock are more susceptible to heat stress than those lighter in weight.
- Dark hided animals are more susceptible to heat stress than light colored animals.
- With high heat indexes, animals should be drinking double the amount compared to normal temperature. If they aren't doing so, closely monitor.

What to do if animal is showing signs of heat stress:

- Contact your veterinarian; if at an exhibition, contact the veterinarian on staff.
- Make sure it is drinking water.
- Cool the animal by running "lukewarm to cool" water on the belly from fore to rear flank area. Extreme cold water could shock the animal.
- Don't move them or create any additional stress for the animal.

Your #1 responsibility at the fair are you and your animals, therefore it is crucial to be there early in the morning till late at night managing them. While the fair is time for fun and friends, these conditions could be life threatening for your animals. Enjoy hanging out in the cool barn playing cards with your friends while keeping a close eye on your project animals.
